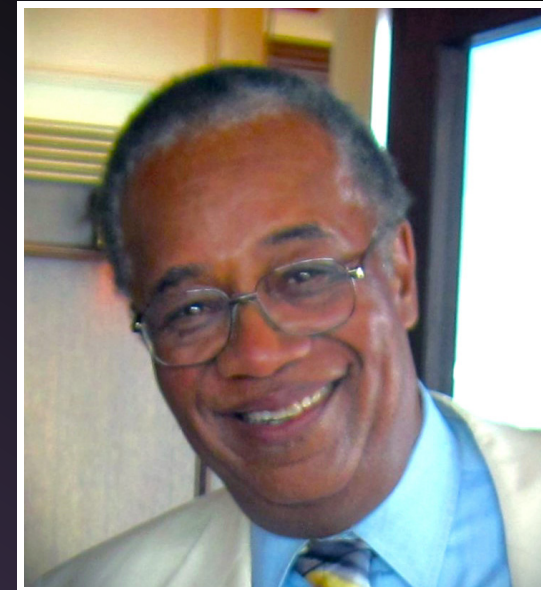

REMEMBERING CHET

Chester M. Terry, (79), passed away on October 27, 2023, surrounded by his loving family. Formerly of Ponte Vedra, FL, he spent the last months of his life in the Boston, MA area.

Chester, fondly known as Chet, was born to Marion M. and Eliza B. Terry, on May 8, 1944, in Clarksville, VA. A graduate of West End High School, he joined the Air Force in 1963 and served in California and the Azores, gaining training as a communications technician. After being honorably discharged, he reconnected with his high school sweetheart, Eleanor, in Baltimore, MD, and they married in 1968. Chet completed his bachelor's degree at Loyola University Maryland and joined the Xerox Corporation, where he was known for his strong work ethic, intelligence, and large network of friends. He retired after a successful 34-year career at Xerox, first in sales, then management, and finally as a senior human resources professional.

A devoted father, Chet instilled in his children a strong commitment to education, an ethos he also encouraged for the other young people in his life. He readily came to the aid of his daughters and supported their varied interests and endeavors, often traveling far distances to attend a performance or share an important milestone. Chet was also a dedicated husband, recently celebrating 55 years of marriage. His love for his wife was undeniable, from the flowers he often bought her, the many trips they took together, and the ways he cared for her in her declining health. Chet also had a boisterous laugh and enjoyed playing with his four grandsons, going to baseball games, and listening to music.

Chet is survived by his wife, Eleanor, two daughters, Bridget and Leslie, son-in-law, Carl, and four grandsons, Quinton, Finley, Malcolm, and Calvin. He is also survived by his six siblings, Lola Laney, Marion Terry, Jr. (Barbara), Vera Garner, Evonnie Gbadebo, Fred Terry, and Torres Terry (Dorita), and numerous nieces and nephews. He is predeceased by his mother and father, whom he supported generously until their final days.
